# **Barossa Valley**

Our hot meal delivery service continues to be supported by our dedicated volunteers. We are blessed with sufficient volunteers for them to only be required to deliver every three to four weeks. The fortnightly frozen delivery run is growing in popularity and while it may seem the wellbeing check and social connection would be less, our Customer Service Officers maintain contact with these customers each fortnight to check on their requirements and menu choices.

We have now extended the frozen meal deliveries to the Southern Barossa Region – including the towns of Williamstown and Lyndoch. This area of the Barossa and Adelaide Hills has previously never had access to a Meals on Wheels service, and the number of referrals is growing. To support the extended delivery a recruitment drive for volunteers from those areas resulted in four very welcome recruits who are also very good spokespeople for the service.

# **Beachport**

We, the members of the Beachport branch, are thrilled to celebrate 7 years of dedicated service and a successful year of operation. Our customer base has adjusted from 5 last year to 2 currently, as many have transitioned to Residential Aged Care. This year, we proudly delivered a total of 558 meals, including 176 to Southend.

Our team of 30 regular volunteers continues to be a cornerstone of our success. Looking ahead, our goals for the next 12 months include actively promoting our service in the community and expanding the number of people we reach.

#### **Berri and Renmark**

The Renmark and Berri branches have enjoyed a busy and productive year – our volunteers are a happy group who all enjoy working together.

We had a very successful Christmas lunch for both branches, and awards were presented to many of the volunteers upon reaching major milestones. The Renmark and Berri hotels supplied the venues for these celebrations and were very kind to keep the costs low for a full 3 course Christmas lunch.

Renmark branch provides hot meals for up to 70 customers daily, and approximately 20 customers who have frozen meals weekly.

The Berri branch has approximately 20 customers daily and these hot meals are supplied by the Berri Hospital.

All of our customers were presented with gifts at Easter as well as a lovely Christmas hamper with a large variety of goodies donated by many local businesses.

A big thank you to our Branch Support Officer Stephen Whaley for all of his help during the year. We also thank Brad Phillips for any and all repairs and problems that were dealt with quickly and efficiently to keep all equipment running smoothly.

A huge thank you to all of the volunteers for their support and commitment – we couldn't do what we do without them.

#### **Blackwood**

This year the Blackwood branch celebrated its 32nd birthday. We held a number of events across the year, starting with our Annual General Meeting and awards ceremony where we were able to thank the many volunteers that enable our branch to function so well. In March we held our birthday BBQ on a beautiful day outside on our lawns that was very well attended and enjoyed. We again celebrated National Volunteers Day with an amazing homemade soup lunch at our branch, superbly organised by our incredible Social Committee. We are grateful for their efforts in planning all of our successful events this year.

We are thrilled to share that former Volunteer Coordinator, Anneke Jeffriess was recently awarded a Boothby Volunteer Service Award. This award reflects the incredible contribution that Anneke has made for more than 17 years and we are very grateful that she continues to volunteer at our branch.

This year we delivered 13,936 hot meals along with 2,900 frozen meals across our four routes. Our customers appreciated the Easter eggs and Christmas hampers that we also supplied.

# **Brighton**

Volunteer numbers are steadily rising, particularly for deliveries, which is a great sign of increasing support. While kitchen volunteer numbers remain steady, we're actively working to address challenges on days when volunteer numbers are tight.

Currently, we have 136 dedicated active volunteers. We understand that numbers may fluctuate seasonally due to holidays and sickness, and we are grateful for the commitment of those who continue to contribute their time and effort.

The branch sends out on average 968 meals per week to 216 customers, with numbers increasing quite quickly in recent times.

We held our annual awards function at the Morphett Arms Hotel in October, with a full turnout. Our volunteer staff worked tirelessly getting the Christmas and Easter frozen orders out, and a big thank you must go to Dot, Tricia and Kirsty for their efforts. We also greatly appreciate our Volunteer Coordinator Karen May, assisted by John Binding for the extra effort they are putting into their roles as Volunteer Coordinators. They have also been a great help in the kitchen with dishing up meals.

We would like to welcome Sandy Petrie to the role of Branch Coordinator. She joined us in March this year from Central Office. It is good to have a permanent member of staff around the branch!

All of our volunteers deserve a huge thank you for their tireless effort as they are our most valuable assets.

#### **Burnside**

The past year has been one of growth and community strength for the Burnside branch. We have continued to deliver not just meals, but also companionship and support to our customers, ensuring their wellbeing and quality of life.

Our success is deeply rooted in the dedication of our volunteers. This year, we have a total of 143 volunteers who have contributed their time and effort to our cause. We are endeavouring to enhance our summer menu with the addition of salads and are working with Riverton Hospital to explore homemade soup options, though staffing challenges have caused some delays.

# **Happy Valley**

We have successfully navigated 2023 – 2024 with no major issues.

Happy Valley has delivered to our many customers in an efficient and good natured manner. Due to an increase in customers we have added another round primarily with existing volunteers plus some excellent new recruits, taking us to 7 rounds. Our average daily meal numbers have increased from an average of 170 per day in 2022/23 to 204 per day in the month of June 2024.

# **Henley and Grange**

Our customer base and meals per week are slightly up from 2022/2023. We have approximately 165 customers, and average 670 hot meals, 65 frozen meals and 50 special meals per week. We have developed a system using a highlighted ALERT on the customer list, which we are pleased to say is working very well.

We often have customers and their relatives comment on the peace of mind they feel with the follow up phone call that they or their relatives receive if they do not answer the door for any reason when their meal is delivered. They have expressed how they feel safer that someone is checking up on them to see if they are ok.

As with any organisation, our volunteer and customer numbers have experienced some natural fluctuations due to ageing, with some volunteers retiring or moving on and long-term customers transitioning into aged care or passing away. Notably, we have recently bid farewell to Silke Danner, our Volunteer Coordinator for over six years, and Steve Jenkins, our Head Chef. We are deeply grateful for their dedicated service. However, we are pleased to report that we continue to attract new customers and volunteers, which has helped maintain a steady balance throughout the year.

On a positive note, Andrew Cameron has stepped into the role of Branch Coordinator. His diverse skill set has been invaluable this past year, particularly in overseeing kitchen operations, ensuring compliance with health standards, and spearheading new green initiatives to reduce plastic waste and protect the environment.

A well deserved recognition.

We thank Committee member Maureen Klau raising \$340.00 for the branch through Rotary calendar sales and the Lions Club of Murray Bridge for donating their delicious Christmas cakes for the past 19 years.

Our thanks to the Murray Bridge Soldiers' Memorial Hospital for their wonderful meal preparation, and the Hospital Maintenance Department for trolley repairs, electrical equipment tagging/testing, upgrading signage, fixing potholes etc.

Thank you again to all of our volunteers particularly the committee members for all that they do for our Murray Bridge branch.

#### **Naracoorte**
